



Case numbers are flattening at a high rate (in the 40s/100,000/wk). We need this rate to be much reduced.





# What is the trend in Kingston for COVID-19?






# **Kingston Hot Spots**











Above average


Kingston Vale & Coombe


## Case rates/100,000/wk by age group, Kingston, 29 March 2021





### Total vaccine uptake - to 21st March 2021 (16+ population)




Number of people vaccinated by this date

# Key messages for everyone

- From today (29th March 2021), groups of UP TO 6
   PEOPLE, or two households, can meet OUTSIDE including in private gardens
- We should STAY LOCAL as much as possible, continue to WORK FROM HOME if we can and keep journeys to a minimum
- We should keep a 2 METRE DISTANCE from anyone not in our household or support bubble
- Remember HANDS, FACE, SPACE and VENTILATE indoor spaces (open a window or door)
- SYMPTOMS? SELF ISOLATE and BOOK A FREE TEST nhs.uk/coronavirus or call 119



# RAPID TESTING - for school families and bubbles

- If you're a parent or carer of a SECONDARY SCHOOL CHILD, help them keep up twice weekly HOME TESTS - it can make a big difference by detecting cases in the community and preventing onward transmission
- If you are in a HOUSEHOLD, SUPPORT or CHILDCARE BUBBLE with a child or nursery, school or college, you can also get REGULAR RAPID TESTS - kingston.gov.uk/schools-testing
- Please keep up with testing throughout the school holidays
- With the start of the schools holidays, remember indoor socialising and sleepovers with those outside of our household and support bubbles are not allowed

# RAPID TESTING - key messages for people who leave home to work or volunteer

- RAPID TESTING using lateral flow devices can help find people who have the virus but have no symptoms - to stop the spread
- IF you leave home to work or volunteer and have NO symptoms, get REGULAR, RAPID TESTS - even if you've previously had Covid or vaccination
- Visit <u>kingston.gov.uk/rapid-testing</u> to book
- TWICE WEEKLY testing at one of our community test sites for people without symptoms can help you continue to work safely without putting others at risk

## **RAPID TESTING - is it worth it?**

- Rapid testing using Lateral Flow Devices is FREE, FAST and EASY
- Rapid testing using LFDs is also RELIABLE
  - It picks up 7 out of 10 positive cases people who would otherwise be in the community spreading the virus
  - The likelihood of a false positive is extremely low, less than 1 in every 1,000

## Vaccine - Who's Eligible Right Now?

You no longer need to wait to be contacted if you fall within one of the following groups:

- People aged 50 and over
- People at high risk from coronavirus (clinically extremely vulnerable)
- People at moderate risk from coronavirus (clinically vulnerable)
- People who live or work in care homes
- Health and social care workers
- Those listed on the GP Learning Disability Register

#### You can book an appointment at a vaccination centre on the NHS website.

- If you are in receipt of, or eligible for Carer's Allowance, you will receive a letter inviting you for vaccination
- Those on the NHS shielded patient list will also receive a letter

# Vaccine - Is booking complicated?

**Booking your vaccination is very easy, the process has been simplified:** 

- You no longer need to be registered with a GP in advance to book
- When booking online, there is a very simple GP registration process
- You do not need to know your NHS number to book
- If you can't book online, you can do so by phone on 119
- You can also book an appointment on behalf of others

#### **FACTS ABOUT THE VACCINE**

1 IS IT SAFE?



Yes. As with any vaccine and medicine, the coronavirus vaccine has gone through all the usual rigorous tests that all vaccines go through to ensure they are completely safe.

2 ARE VACCINES IMPORTANT



Yes. Vaccines save about 3 million lives worldwide every year. A coronavirus vaccine is our way out of the current crisis and restrictions.

3 DO I HAVE TO PAY?



No. The coronavirus vaccine is always available free of charge, and the NHS will never ask you to share bank details to confirm your identity. 4 DOES THE VACCINE CONTAIN ANYTHING OF ANIMAL ORIGIN?



No. You can see the ingredients of the coronavirus vaccines on the MHRA website. It does not contain any animal products, nor does it contain alcohol.

5 DOES IT HAVE SIDE EFFECTS?



Some people might feel slightly unwell afterwards, in the same way as after the annual flu jab, but no significant side effects have been observed in the tens of thousands of people involved in trials.

BE AWARE THAT ANTI-VACCINE STORIES ARE OFTEN SPREAD ONLINE THROUGH SOCIAL MEDIA. THESE STORIES MAY NOT BE BASED ON SCIENTIFIC EVIDENCE

#### **ALWAYS REMEMBER THE BASICS - HANDS, FACE, SPACE**

- Keep rooms well ventilated.
  - The virus is spread through aerosol particles in the air, so opening windows regularly can cut the amount of virus present in the air in any room.
- Even once you've had your coronavirus vaccination, you must continue to follow all the guidance to control the virus and save lives.
