



Workshops for local primary and secondary schools

Hayes Ng, a PHD student at Kingston University will be running workshops at local primary and secondary schools and at Kingston Museum exploring migration, the local community and celebrating diversity within our borough from May to October 2025.

Workshop 1: Community Mapping

This workshop invites students to explore living in Kingston through creative mapping, fostering a sense of connection and belonging. Over the session students will use mapping tools to visualize the places, people, and experiences that shape their daily lives. Guided activities encourage students to reflect on their personal stories, share perspectives, and collaborate on creating a collective Kingston map. This process not only allows students to see their role within their community but also provides a platform for emotional expression and engagement.

By the end of the workshop, students will contribute to the "Kingston Map Collection," a compilation of their maps that will form part of a community archive. This archive will serve as a valuable cultural resource, showcasing the diversity and experiences of Kingston's youth. The workshop helps foster self awareness, creativity, and empathy while encouraging students to view themselves as active contributors to their environment. It also strengthens ties between students and their community, highlighting the importance of youth voices in shaping Kingston's identity.



Workshop 2: Memories Archive

This workshop explores the relationship between objects, memory, and identity through storytelling. Using the concept of luggage as a narrative tool, students will reflect on personal or imagined journeys and the items they would carry. Through guided illustration and discussion, the workshop reveals the deep cultural and emotional significance of everyday items.

By creating visual narratives, students will engage with themes of migration, and belonging. The process encourages introspection, sharing of personal stories, and the discovery of commonalities between people. The outcomes—a series of illustrated "memory archives"— will highlight the unique and collective experiences of participants, contributing to a broader cultural dialogue. This workshop not only enhances students' storytelling and creative skills but also promotes inclusivity, offering a subtle yet powerful way to connect through shared human experiences.

Workshop 3: Personal Palette and Collage

This workshop introduces students to the exciting connection between culture, identity, and creative expression through hands-on activities. Students will explore how elements from their cultural heritage - such as patterns inspired by architecture, fashion, or everyday objects - can be transformed into unique personal designs. Using mark-making techniques, they will create patterns that reflect their individual identities, emotions, and connections to the world around them. In the second part of the workshop, students will use the patterns they've created to assemble personal collages.

By the end of the workshop, students will have developed their creative skills, gained confidence in telling their own stories, and created artwork that reflects their personal and cultural identity.





Anglo-Saxon Workshops at Kingston Museum

On the 1100th anniversary of Athelstan's coronation in Kingston, book a school visit to Kingston Museum for an Anglo-Saxon inspired workshop. These sessions are the perfect introduction for students as they discover Kingston's connections to the Anglo-Saxon period.

Our Kingston Story Key Stage 1 | 45-60 minutes

Get 'hands on' with history with Our Kingston Story - an interactive introduction to the history of Kingston-upon-Thames. There is only one problem - our map is missing important moments from Kingston's history! We need your help to rediscover Kingston's past. Explore Kingston Museum and discover local heroes, Athelstan, first King of England, and Eadweard Muybridge, pioneering Victorian photographer as you develop an awareness of local history through key events, people and places. You will be encouraged to ask questions and seek answers as we rediscover those missing moments in order to tell our collective Kingston story

Saxon Stories - In partnership with All Saints Church Key Stage 2 | 105 minutes

In partnership with All Saints Church, we offer a dual workshop package that includes an interactive session at both Kingston Museum and All Saints Church.

Discover Kingston's rich Anglo-Saxon history and develop an understanding of daily life in Saxon Kingston through object-based exploration at Kingston Museum. Using this knowledge, you will then walk in the footsteps of Athelstan, first King of England by reenacting his coronation ceremony at All Saints Church over a thousand years ago.

Each workshop lasts approximately 45 minutes with an additional 15 minutes to transfer between the two sites. This also provides a great opportunity to see the Coronation Stone - believed to have been present at up to seven Anglo-Saxon coronations - as you travel between sites.



Saxon Stories (Museum only) Key Stage 2 | 45-60 minutes

The Saxons were renowned for their storytelling and you can join us here, at Kingston Museum, to find out about the role Kingston played in the Saxon story.

Exploring the Museum, you will help us tell over 600 years of Anglo-Saxon history through guided exploration and embedded object handling as you discover what life was like in 'Cyningestun'. Our workshop covers the period from the Roman withdrawal (410) to the eve of the Battle of Hastings (1066) with a particular focus on Athelstan and the Vikings.

This session has been curated in line with the local history of Kingston and the National Curriculum. It aims to consolidate classroom-based learning in a museum environment.

Saxon Textiles - In partnership with Ariadne's Thread Group Key Stage 2 | 90 minutes

Come and learn about the history of natural fibres from the Anglo-Saxon period in a hands-on workshop. Watch the magical process of how sheep fleece and flax were turned into yarns and cloth. In this interactive session the students will have an opportunity to try basic yarn spinning and practice simple embroidery techniques. There will be time to explore the museum's textiles collection and ask questions about their history and the making.

All of our Anglo-Saxon workshops take place on-site at Kingston Museum.
