Coronavirus Infection Survey Pilot (07/10/22)

(estimating the proportion of people in the community with COVID-19, and those newly-infected)

Key estimate at national level:

- → 2.03% (1.57% last week, and 1.41% the week before) of the community population in England estimated to have had COVID-19 at any given time between 18th September and 24th September 2022.
- → This equates to 3,218, or approximately 1 in 49, Kingston residents with COVID-19
- → 3,218 positive tests in Kingston would equate to a rate of 1,825 per 100,000 population

Regional (London) estimate:


- → 1.76% (1.47% last week, 1.25 data the week before) of the community population aged two and over in London estimated to have been infectious for COVID-19 on 21st September 2022
- → This equates to 2,790, or approximately 1 in 57, Kingston residents with COVID-19
- → 2,790 positive tests in Kingston would equate to a rate of 1,582 per 100,000 population

Weekly case rates per 100,000 population










